
As the guest of honour, the King Baudouin Foundation will be organising a series of lectures that zoom in on masterpieces from its collection. These lectures will take place in the area behind the Foundation's stand, where visitors will also get to explore additional inspiring stories and some of the Foundation's transversal projects. A wonderful opportunity to experience how philanthropy, heritage and cultural preservation, and social welfare are intrinsically connected.

On a mission for heritage and culture

BRAFA is the perfect occasion for the King Baudouin Foundation to honour 50 years of giving. Since its creation in 1976, the Foundation has been working to strengthen solidarity and improve society. For decades, it has also been supporting donors who are passionate about heritage. The King Baudouin Foundation currently manages no fewer than 154 philanthropic funds that are focused on heritage, art, and culture.

We should cherish philanthropists and donors that want to safeguard art and heritage: their donations are gifts for everyone, for the next generation, for the future. Thanks to these actors' generosity, the Foundation was able to acquire a sizeable and diverse collection these past decades, encompassing more than 29,000 works of art – from archaeological treasures to modern art, from lace and jewellery to paintings and design – and 31 archive funds.

Through its Heritage & Culture programme, the Foundation preserves and protects these exceptional works of art, documents, and objects. All of the Foundation's pieces are on long-term loan to over a hundred museums and public custodial institutions, to make them accessible to each and every one of us.

Highlights of BRAFA 2026

The King Baudouin Foundation's stand at the fair will offer visitors unique insight into the Foundation's multi-facetted collection. To mark its anniversary, the Foundation will not only be showcasing some of its most recent acquisitions (as it usually does at the fair),

but also a selection of masterpieces that became part of its collection at an earlier point and that are now part of Belgium's public heritage.

Some of the Foundation's recent acquisitions that will be on display include:

- Pol Bury, Bracelet Boules des deux côtes d'un carré, 1968
 An iconic piece of art jewellery and prime example of kinetic art, acquired by the Christian Bauwens Fund.
- Evelyne Axell, L'égocentrique 2, 1968

A striking pop art painting that celebrates female subjectivity and liberty, acquired by the Isabelle and Philippe Dewez Fund.

 A 19th-century gem made of Brussels lace, acquired by the Marie-Jeanne Dauchy Fund.





Iconic acquisitions that will be featured:

- **View of Brussels** by Jean-Baptiste Bonnecroy, a unique cityscape of Belgium's capital city from 1664–1665.
- The Silver Owl Cup, the oldest known Antwerp creation made from coconut, is a true masterpiece from the Golden Age
- The Holy Blood ensign (Bruges, 1529), an exceptional, late-Gothic, richly symbolic sculpture.
- Portrait of Jan Vekemans by Cornelis de Vos (1624), entrusted to the Museum Mayer van den Bergh to complete a series of family portraits.
